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FOREWORD

As we complete 10 years of being Project KHEL, we are both ecstatic and proud of the journey that we have made. Starting with around 200 children, in 2 rural schools and 1 shelter home, to reaching out to over 40,000 children and adults directly through our play-based programs, we have indeed come a long way.

Through this decade, we have kept our ears and our eyes open, trying to learn from the communities we work in, building our skills, and designing dynamic interventions that are relevant and make sense to the spaces we work in. We are grateful for the love we have received from the communities and the challenges that helped us rethink our processes. We feel immense gratitude towards every single facilitator who has ever worked with us and helped us continue to hold our children at the center of every decision we make.

For us, this year has been about regaining stability and acting upon the hope that pulled us through the three waves of COVID-19. We resumed work with some of our old partner institutions, lost a few community centers as our children migrated to different cities for newer prospects, and started a few new centers too. We have also had to equip ourselves with the newer challenges that face our children in a post-COVID world. Two questions that stayed with us through the year were -

- 1. How do we keep our children interested in games outside their phones,
- 2. How do we keep our program relevant to the new challenges that face our children?


Thus our 10th year of being was spent very similar to our first, where we had to rework our curriculum through trial and error and keep our ears and eyes open to the new needs of our children.



Uzma's journey with Project KHEL, since early 2022, right after COVID has been a story of growth and change. Initially. she came across as participating uncomfortable activities requiring interaction with boys. We did, however, see potential in her as a leader, so let her take her time, while also nudging her to take up more leadership roles in her class. By the end of the year 2022, Uzma has evolved into our most efficient peer leader in the center. She helps us set up the playspace, manages children even without being made the captain. creates game strategies, enforces rules for activity, and motivates her peers to participate fully.

KAMELA

Kamela is in her early teens. transitioning from a child to a young woman. She is already in charge of all the chores at home and takes care of vounger siblings. She eniovs her playing in our sessions but is also aware that the space is public and stays held back. We have noticed how she always hides herself and rarely ever speaks out in front of the group. We firmly believe in creating safe spaces where children grow at their own pace. Eventually, we saw Kamela asking others to be quiet while we were sharing instructions for the activity and then moved on to creating strategies for her team, playing fair, cheering for her team, and enjoying to the fullest. Kamela has graduated into our program for adolescent girls, where she is our champion mobilizer!



In our play spaces, we constantly create opportunities for conversations that humanize all genders to each other. On one such day, we designed a session on having 2-minute conversations among our children on love, happiness, anger, and sadness. Maaz and Anamika were a pair that stood out. Anamika started the conversation as the listener, hesitating about talking to a boy, she hid three-fourths of her body under the bench, and Maaz craftily engaged her in a conversation that got Anamika almost out of under the bench. Maaz has evolved as a sensitive young man, who knows better than to show frustration and instead encourage his female peers to feel at ease in sharing space with him.

RAVEENA

We have known Raveena since she was 8 years old, back in 2013. She was among the slower-paced children, who always had to put extra effort to match the speed of the other children, and still fell short. Over the years, Raveena has graduated from our life skills program and joined our Ultimate Frisbee program. She is also the slowest athlete among all our senior ones and yet has joined her team in every possible tournament as a substitute player. However, doing the same thing over and over, she has understood what work needs to be put in to manage a team of players and Raveena has emerged as one of our more dependable senior athletes, who takes uр mentorina opportunities for the junior players and manages most of our communication with them.

NEHA, VANDANA, ROSHNI

Born into the 'wrong' caste and the wrong 'gender', every single one of our female athletes has to work a little harder to show up for their coaching. Their participation in a fairly unpopular sport (in India!) that requires them to play in the sun, get tanned, run around with boys, leave the house at dawn for practice, and return late in the evening after dark from practice and travel to strange cities for tournaments without a family member to 'keep an eye on them' becomes reason enough, not just for their extended families but also their neighbors, to have a say on their characters.

Engaging in an activity for passion, that does not bring monetary returns adds yet another layer of objection to their participation in the sport.

Yet, our girls persevered, they believed in what they were doing, so they thickened their skin and worked with their families to not let them get affected by the nasty remarks from people around them. While the journey of every single athlete of ours is inspirational, the stars of the year remain Vandana, Roshni, and Neha, who got selected to represent Team India at the Asian Oceanic Ultimate and Guts Championship to be held in the Philipines in September 2023.

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


HIGHLIGHTS

- 3 of our Athletes Neha, Roshni, and Vandana selected for Team India




INCOME SOURCES (DOMESTIC) - Rs. 27,77,881
