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FOREWORD

This year has been one of transformation, learning, and renewed purpose for all of us at Project KHEL. Looking back, we are filled with gratitude — for the trust our partners continue to place in us, for the resilience and adaptability of our team, and most of all, for the children and young people whose energy and curiosity remind us, every day, why we do what we do.

This year, our work deepened in multiple ways. Through programs like Made in Maidaan, FrisB(arabar), and a series of Workshops and Training-of-Trainers (ToTs), we directly reached over 3,400 children and young people across seven states, creating joyful, safe, and inclusive learning spaces that went beyond sport or classroom instruction. The diversity of our engagements — from menstrual hygiene conversations under Red Spot, to comprehensive sex education in Teen Talks and gamification workshops with partner organisations — reaffirmed our belief that play is not a pause from learning; it is the most powerful form of it.

Yet, like every meaningful journey, this year was not without its challenges. Staff transitions and the constant balancing act between implementation and institutional strengthening tested our capacities. Finding the right people — those who align not just in skill but in spirit — remains an ongoing process. But even through these shifts, what stood out was our team's courage to adapt, to step up for each other, and to keep the work grounded in empathy and purpose.

Amidst these transitions, we also witnessed remarkable growth — both within our team and among the communities we work with. From young facilitators designing their own games around gender and life skills, to our youth coaches representing India on international platforms, each story reaffirmed that when young people are trusted and supported, they rise with creativity and leadership that exceeds all expectations.

Our partnerships too have been a source of strength and inspiration. Collaborations with EMpower, Rohini Nilekani Philanthropies, Greencliffe Foundation, and other partners enabled us to expand our reach and refine our methods. Engagements with Ultimate Peace and Girls Not Brides opened new opportunities for cross-learning and global feminist dialogue — culminating in our participation at the AWID Forum 2024 and the groundwork

for future projects with the Girl First Fund.

As we reflect on this year, what stays with us most is not the scale of our numbers, but the depth of transformation we witnessed — in children finding their voice, in girls taking the lead, in communities learning to play and question together. These quiet shifts are the real indicators of change. To every child, partner, team member, supporter, and friend — thank you for being part of this journey. Together, we continue to hold space for play, for questioning, for joy — and for the kind of learning that builds not just knowledge, but humanity.

PLAY AS PEDAGOGY:

In our design, "play" is not just recreation — it is a deliberate learning medium. Activities are contextual, experiential, and co-created so that children become active learners.

FACILITATORS, NOT TEACHERS:

Instead of a top-down model, our team of facilitators guide, reflect, listen, and colearn with participants. The sessions are spaces of trust, expression, and experimentation.

REFLECTION & FEEDBACK:

We use structured debriefs and continuous reflection to adjust and improve our methods, ensuring learning flows both ways — from children to facilitators, and back.

GENDER LENS & INCLUSIVE DESIGN:

Every activity, every word, every interaction is designed to overcome biases. We train facilitators to practice gender-neutral language, integrated play, and active disruption of stereotypes.

EMPOWERING YOUNG VOICES, BUILDING SAFE SPACES

The year 2024–25 marked a significant leap in our outreach and impact. Through a range of creative and participatory initiatives—Made in Maidan, FrisB(arabar), and a series of Workshops and Training-of-Trainers—we continued to create inclusive, gender-equitable, and safe spaces for learning, play, and expression.

STORIES OF CHANGE

NITIN: FROM BULLY TO LEADER: NITIN'S JOURNEY OF CHANGE

When Nitin first joined our program, facilitators found him challenging—quick—witted, disruptive, and often using his influence to derail sessions. His assertive identity and polarizing behaviour made it difficult to connect. But instead of reacting with resistance, our team responded with warmth and inclusion, showing him that his energy could belong without division.

We shifted our approach—from seeing Nitin as a troublemaker to understanding him as a child seeking connection. Consistency became our anchor: we set boundaries, recognized positive behaviour through our "Good Bachcha" system, and ensured Nitin felt valued even when disciplined.

Eighteen months later, a breakthrough came when Nitin publicly owned up to his team's mistake—a first act of accountability. We celebrated him as a "Good Bachcha," and for the first time, his peers admired him for kindness, not mischief. From then on, Nitin began using his voice to support and motivate others.

By the end of two years, the boy once known for disruption became a symbol of fairness and team spirit. His classmates noticed the change, too—"Now he explains things to us," one said. Nitin shared, "I realized I can be the bigger person by being better, not by being a bully."

His story is proof that empathy, consistency, and belief in every child's potential can transform resistance into leadership.

FROM ALOOF TO EMPATHETIC: RESHMA'S JOURNEY OF BELONGING

When Reshma first joined our sessions, she kept her distance—confident yet detached, often walking out when things didn't go her way. Coming from a slightly better-off family in a community of rag pickers, she stood apart in appearance and attitude. Her mother's initial hostility towards our facilitators only deepened that divide.

But we stayed consistent—offering every greeting, every invitation, and every smile without judgment or special treatment. Slowly, something shifted. Reshma began sitting with the group, clapping for others, and helping clean up. What started as reluctant participation grew into quiet engagement and genuine care.

The turning point came when she was paired with Malika, a younger child who often arrived unkempt. One day, Reshma took her home, helped her get ready and brought her back to the session. That simple act marked a transformation—from separation to solidarity.

Today, Reshma leads through empathy—
clearing the play area so no one,
gets hurt, helping peers, and cheering for others
before herself. Even her mother, once resistant,
now supports her wholeheartedly.

Reshma's journey shows how steady, nonjudgmental connection can bridge divides. Through Project KHEL's consistent care and belief, she discovered that true confidence comes not from standing apart—but from standing with others.

MAKING TOURNAMENTS ACCESSIBLE

CHILLY-O 2024: A TRIBUTE THAT BECAME A MOVEMENT

Two years after losing our dear friend and teammate Arun, Chilly-O 2024 emerged as more than just a sports event—it became a celebration of spirit, inclusion, and community. Named after Arun's favorite cheer, Chilly-O captures his joyful energy and love for the game.

What began as a memorial tournament in 2023 evolved this year into India's first Ultimate Frisbee tournament designed for the development sector, ensuring that cost and access would never limit participation. Thanks to the support of our funders, teams paid no registration or accommodation fees, and enjoyed sponsored meals, transport, refreshments, and gifts—creating a truly level playing field.

In 2024, 14 teams from 4 states and 5 NGOs, alongside Project KHEL's own teams, took the field for 39 spirited matches involving over 230 players. Every match carried forward Arun's values of fairness, camaraderie, and joy. The Chilly-O Scholarship, established in Arun's memory, continues to honour young leaders who embody empathy and integrity. This year, two boys from our life-skills program received bicycles to help them pursue education, work, and sport—turning opportunity into mobility.

As the cheers faded, what remained was a renewed belief in the power of play to build connection and compassion.

Here's to Arun—and to keeping his spirit alive through every throw, every laugh, and every "Chilly-O!"

GROWTH OPPORTUNITIES FOR TEAM

This year was marked by continued growth, learning, and leadership within our team. Members not only strengthened their professional and personal capacities but also represented the organization across diverse local, national, and international platforms.

LEADERSHIP AND REPRESENTATION IN ULTIMATE FRISBEE

Two of our senior frisbee athletes, Manju and Roshni, served as selectors for the State Ultimate Frisbee Team of Delhi, showcasing leadership, expertise, and recognition within the broader sports community.

INTERNATIONAL EXPOSURE AND YOUTH LEADERSHIP

Our senior frisbee athlete and PLAYducator, Kajal, represented India at the Ultimate Peace Camp in New Jersey, USA, exemplifying global youth exchange and cross-cultural learning through sport.

YOUTH ADVOCACY AND CAPACITY BUILDING

Our Youth Coach, Roshni, was selected to serve on the Girl Advisory Committee for EMpower, India. Through this platform, she participated in multiple capacity-building workshops on mental health, budgeting, proposal review, and organizational visits — and contributed as a speaker in several panel discussions.

LEARNING AND SHARING KNOWLEDGE



Team members participated in EMpower's Learning Journey (Delhi), gaining exposure to innovative practices in youth development. Roshni also represented our organization as one of the presenters, sharing insights from our field experiences.

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GLOBAL FEMINIST PERSPECTIVES

Our Executive Director, Angana, attended the AWID Forum 2024 in Bangkok, engaging with global peers on feminist leadership and movement building, and bringing valuable insights back to strengthen our work at home.

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EXPANDING GRASSROOTS SPORTS AND YOUTH LEADERSHIP

Through our grassroots sports initiatives in 2024–25, we engaged over 360 young players (230 male and 130 female) across 17 community centers, facilitated 6 local and 11 outstation tournaments, and supported 14 youth coaches in leadership roles. These experiences not only built athletic skills but also fostered teamwork, discipline, and confidence among youth from diverse age groups.



A SABBATICAL FOR OUR FOUNDER-DIRECTOR

Our Founder-Director, Akshai, was awarded a Cocoon Initiative Sabbatical Grant, a fellowship that supports civil-society leaders to pause, recharge, and return with renewed purpose. Through this opportunity, they will step back from daily responsibilities to rest, reflect, and explore new ideas that can strengthen our work with young people and communities.

The sabbatical represents not just a personal milestone, but also an investment in sustainable, compassionate leadership—ensuring our organization continues to grow with clarity, care, and creativity.


INCOME SOURCES (DOMESTIC): RS. 29,55,772
